In 1864, there were four original Arizona Territory counties: Yavapai, Pima, Yuma and Mohave. Presently, there are fifteen counties in Arizona. They range in date of creation from 1884 - 1983.

After territorial creation, there was briefly a Paiute County, formed from the northern part of Mohave County. The land south of the Gila River was part of the Gadsden Purchase. This conforms generally to the northern boundary of the original Pima County.
